What is UAC?

User Account Control (UAC) is a feature in Windows® that help prevent unauthorized (malware) executions or changes to your computer. UAC does this by asking the user for permission or administrator credentials before performing an action. A typical example of an UAC elevation prompt is the one we see below.

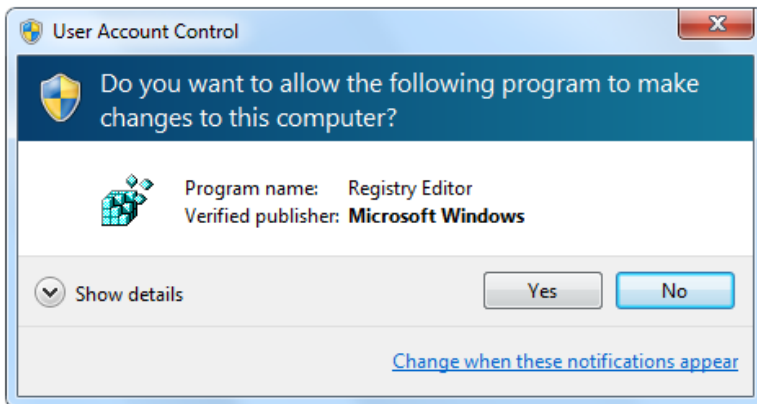


Figure 1:3 An UAC elevation prompt under Windows® 7.

What Is UAC Controller Tool v1.0?

UAC Controller Tool v1.0 is a free software tool that you can use to quickly control UAC.

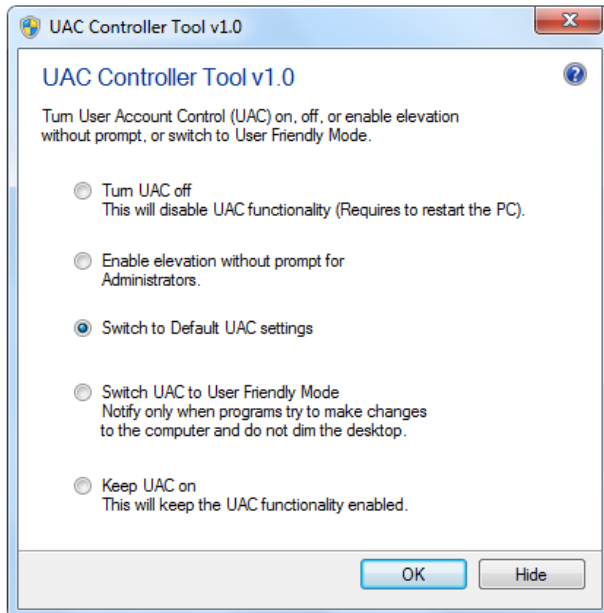


Figure 2:3 UAC Controller Tool v1.0 running in Windows® 7.

In UAC Controller Tool v1.0 you can choose between 5 different choices this is awesome since you can switch between these very easy. UAC Controller Too v1.0 is very easy to use, choose one of the five options click OK and that's it for this part.

Another awesome feature that UAC Controller Tool v1.0 has is the **Quick Choice**, this allows the user to change UAC settings without opening the UI of the program, the user can now right-click on the icon hidden in the tray area, and switch his/her choice.

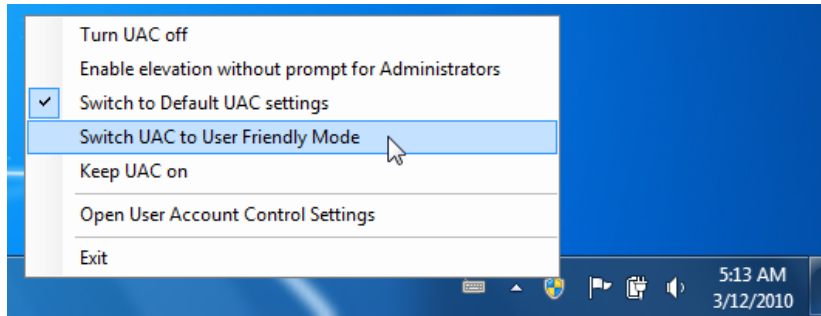


Figure 3:3 The *Quick Choice* feature allows you to right-click the UAC Controller Tool v1.0 icon in the tray area, and from the menu make your choice.

Explaining the options in UAC Controller Tool v1.0

Option	Description
Turn UAC off	Will turn of UAC (Requires a PC restart to take effect)
Enable elevation without prompt for Administrators	UAC is enabled but the annoying prompts are disabled for Administrators
Switch to Default UAC settings	Sets the default UAC settings
Switch UAC to User Friendly Mode	Turns off UAC for Windows® -based programs and Microsoft® programs and does not dim the desktop
Keep UAC on	Turns off UAC (Requires a PC restart to take effect)
